

#### **Opening Plenary:**

Monday, 21 July 2025, 1:00-2:15

Ukraine, Poland and a Changing World Order: Dame Melinda Simmons in Conversation with Uilleam Blacker (UCL SSEES)

Dame Melinda Simmons is Ambassador Designate of the United Kingdom to Poland. From 2019-2023, she served as Ambassador to Ukraine, a period which coincided with the launch of Russia's full-scale invasion. Dame Melinda remained in Kyiv for most of that this time, playing a crucial and very public role in facilitating the UK's support for Ukraine. Prior to her diplomatic work, Dame Melinda worked in the National Security Secretariat, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the Department for International Development. Her career has

taken in diverse geographical contexts from Ukraine and Kosovo to South Sudan and Somalia, Yemen and Israel, bringing her into contact with major challenges, from the Eurozone crisis and the Arab Spring to Russia's war against Ukraine. In this conversation, Dame Melinda will talk about her personal connections with east-central Europe, reflect on lessons her time in Ukraine, and look forward to the challenges facing Poland, Europe and the world at a time of crisis and war.

Twinning for Transformation: Global Partnerships and the Reconstruction of Ukraine

**Dame Sally Mapstone**, Principal and Vice-Chancellor of the University of St Andrews in Scotland

Mychailo Wynnyckyj, Ukrainian Deputy Minister of Science and Education Mykola Trofymenko, Rector of Mariupol State University Charles Cormack, Cormack Consultancy Group

Chair: Matthias Neumann (East Centre, University of East Anglia)

This plenary roundtable brings together senior leaders and policymakers from Ukraine and the UK to examine how university partnerships are driving resilience, reform, and renewal in Ukrainian higher education. Framed around the UK–Ukraine Twinning Initiative, the discussion will explore how initial acts of solidarity are evolving into sustainable, strategic collaborations that support institutional development, internationalisation, and the broader reconstruction of post-war Ukraine.

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Dame Sally Mapstone FRSE is the Principal and Vice-Chancellor of the University of St Andrews in Scotland, a position she took up in 2016. Professor Mapstone is President of Universities UK for the period 2023-25. At a national and international level, Professor Mapstone has also served as the Convener of Universities Scotland, Vice-Chair of the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland, and as Chair of the International Advisory



Board for the University of Helsinki. She is also currently the Chair of the Higher Education Policy Institute (HEPI) board and a trustee of the Europaeum. Before St Andrews, Dame Sally's career was spent at the University of Oxford, where she was latterly Pro-Vice Chancellor for Education in the University, and Professor of Older Scots Literature in its Faculty of English, as well as a Fellow of St Hilda's College.



Mykola Trofymenko is the Rector of Mariupol State University. He also holds key leadership positions, including Deputy Chair of the Union of Rectors of Ukraine, Member of the Mariupol City Council, and Member of the European Universities Association Task Force for Ukraine. Additionally, he contributes to the Council of the Foundation of the President of Ukraine for Support of Education, Culture, and Sports and is a Board Member of the Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine. Beyond academia, he has been actively engaged in governmental and policy-making activities, serving as an Adviser to the Head of Donetsk Regional State Administration and Chairman of the Deputy Commission on Education, Culture, Youth, Sports, and Tourism in the Mariupol City Council.

Charles Cormack is the founder of Cormack Consultancy Group a specialist Higher Education consultancy working with universities on the development of strategic international projects. The company has offices in UK, US, Australia, India, Romania and Lithuania as well representation in a number of other markets. He has worked in Central and Eastern Europe for the past 25 years and initiated the Ukraine Twinning scheme withing a couple of week of the full scale Russian invasion of Ukraine. Charles is in the council of Mariupol State University, a Trustee of Goodenough College and received an honorary doctorate from Bishop Grosseteste University for the work he has done in developing internationalisation within Higher Education



**Mychailo Wynnyckyj** is currently Ukraine's Deputy Minister of Education and Science with responsibility for higher education. Prior to Russia's full-scale invasion, he held various appointments at Ukraine's National University "Kyiv-Mohyla Academy" (Sociology Dep't and



Business School), including Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, and a cross-appointment to the Business School of Ukrainian Catholic University in Lviv. From 2019 to 2022 he served as Head of the Secretariat of Ukraine's National Agency for Higher Education Quality Assurance, and prior to that as Advisor to three of Ukraine's Ministers of Education (2015-2019). Originally from Canada, Mychailo has lived permanently in Kyiv for over two decades. He was awarded a PhD in 2004 from the University of Cambridge (U.K.).



Sergey Radchenko - A Permanent Cold War: Great Power Rivalries, and the Future of the International Order

Chair: David Milne (University of East Anglia)

Sergey Radchenko is the Wilson E. Schmidt Distinguished Professor at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. He has written extensively on the Cold War, nuclear history, and on Russian and Chinese foreign and security policies. His books include *To Run the World: the* 



Kremlin's Cold War Bid for Global Power (Cambridge UP, 2024), Two Suns in the



Heavens: the Sino-Soviet Struggle for Supremacy (Wilson Center Press & Stanford UP, 2009), and Unwanted Visionaries: the Soviet Failure in Asia (Oxford UP, 2014). Professor Radchenko is a native of Sakhalin Island, Russia, was educated in the US, Hong Kong, and the UK, where he received his PhD in 2005 (LSE).

# Broken Pasts, Fragmented Futures Yugoslav and post-Yugoslav Film Festival at ICCEES 2025

Curated by Fedor Tot (East Centre, University of East Anglia)

Yugoslav and post-Yugoslav film history is, perhaps inevitably given the region's 20<sup>th</sup> century history, one of continual disruption. These six films—three contemporary documentaries (both the result of post-Yugoslav international coproductions), two features and a short from the Yugoslav era—offer a glimpse into wider traditions of filmmaking. Of the three documentaries, *Mamula All Inclusive* commits to an activist mode of history, viewing the development of a luxury hotel in

Montenegro through the lens of heritage memory, whilst the diptych of films comprising *Scenes from the Labudović Reels* displays the value of archives to enliven and enrich our memory of the past. Both documentaries take stories from a once-united Yugoslavia, and analyse their meaning for future generations. If one can be accused of Yugo-nostalgia, can one also be accused of Yugo-futurism?

The Yugoslav-era films are all centred around the city and urbanisation in the post-WWII era, a time when Yugoslavia's population demographics shifted rapidly. Both feature films are romances but could not be further apart stylistically. Dušan Makavejev's Love Affair is an aesthetically imaginative work melding essayistic documentary and breezy romance, set amidst a Belgrade perpetually under construction. It starts out as a light romance but quickly repudiates the idea of sunny socialism and escapism. The other, Zenica, from a decade earlier, appears to hark to a time of socialist realism, of simpler and more clear-cut narrative conflicts. And yet here too, we can find evidence of disruption, of narratives not quite adhering as tightly as one might assume. Living conditions form a source of anxiety for our protagonists in both Zenica and Love Affair: the short, My Apartment connects satirises those living conditions with wit and humour.

#### Scenes from the Labudović Reels

Dir: Mila Turajlić; Croatia/France/Montenegro/Qatar/Serbia; Documentary; 2022

Non-Aligned (100 mins)

#### • Cine-Guerrillas (94 mins)

Stevan Labudović spent much of his working life as a cameraman for Filmske Novosti, Yugoslavia's newsreel production institute. As such, he had a front-row seat to a significant chunk of the 20<sup>th</sup> century's key moments. Mila Turajlić's diptych of documentaries looks at his life's work, excavating the archival record to discover a humble man from Berane, Montenegro, who ended up capturing the first Conference of the Non-Aligned Movement in Belgrade in 1961, travelling with Tito on the yacht Galeb as his personal cameraman, and filming for the Algerian Liberation Army in the '50s and '60s, sent by Yugoslavia to counter French propaganda (though in interviews he continually downplays his achievements).

The Non-Aligned half of the diptych concerns, as the title implies, the creation of the Non-Aligned Movement, as well as a broad overview of Labudović's life. Here Turajlić questions in part the purpose of creating her film: "Why dig out images which hardly anyone remembers?" her voiceover states, pondering the many liberatory heads of state present at the Conference who would later become tyrants, and that's before we get to the violent breakup of Yugoslavia still to come. But the purpose soon becomes clear.

Labudović's images were recorded without sound, intended for other journalists to record their narratorly reports later, (mis)interpreting his work as they saw fit. A trip to the archives at Radio Belgrade, which separately houses the speech recordings, offers the chance to sync up the cameraman's imagery with the spoken word: figures long gone are suddenly alive again, staking their claim for a fiercely independent, post-colonial worldview, away from the influence of the USA or the USSR.

Cine-Guerrillas's focus is narrower, with Turajlić following in Labudović's footsteps in Algeria, starting from a museum exhibit featuring his old camera and uniform. From there, she tracks down and interviews surviving veterans who worked with Labudović, with Labudović recalling his own experience. Key to the question of his time in Algeria is the right to a people for their own self-image: the Laval Decree restricted Africans in French-controlled territories from filmmaking, and access to filmmaking tools was difficult to come by. Labudović's presence was thus both an act of personal collaboration between himself and his colleagues, and a means for newly-independent nations to define their own state of being.

#### Wednesday 10.45am

#### Mamula All Inclusive

Dir: Aleksandar Reljić; Serbia/Bosnia and Herzegovina/Montenegro; Documentary; 2023; 58 mins.

The island of Mamula guards the entrance to the Bay of Kotor: some 200m in diameter, the Austro-Hungarians built a fortress built atop the island in 1853 to keep out incursions into the bay. In WWII, Italian Axis forces used the island as a concentration camp, torturing the local population in horrendous conditions. In 2016, with the fortress dilapidated and in need of renewal, the Montenegrin government decided to accept a bid to turn the island into a luxury resort.

Reljić's film follows the dwindling group of camp survivors and local residents who campaign against the luxury resort, returning year upon year to mark the camp's liberation. Local politics, skullduggery and ideological betrayal hover in the background, but in the foreground remains the palimpsest of history, where a site of torture and misery has been paved over, renewed and renovated into an elegant, high-class experience set amidst a beautiful landscape. The film also turns to local youngsters, who prior to the island's gentrification, would frequently use it as a quiet summertime spot, seemingly nonchalant about the spectre of history still haunting the place. Where does this history go once one memory has been replaced by another? *Mamula All Inclusive* asks pertinent and timely questions about the presence of history and heritage in an increasingly lawless, neoliberal world where local concerns are frequently ignored (or even paid off, as some in the film suggests) in favour of luxury high-end experiences frequented by nobody in particular.

#### Wednesday 14:45

#### Zenica

Dir: Miloš Stefanović & Jovan Živanović; Yugoslavia; Feature Film; 1957, 84 mins.

Starring: Rade Marković, Gordana Miletić, Mata Milošević, Stole Arandjelović, Pavle Vujisić.

On the surface, *Zenica* is a rather dogmatic work of socialist realism. Set amidst the rapid expansion of the steelworks in the titular city in Bosnia-Herzegovina, and the area's extreme modernisation and urbanisation after the destruction of WWII, we follow factory engineer Bora (Rade Marković) who has just moved to the city from Belgrade alongside his wife Divna (Gordana Miletić) to oversee the factory's expansion. From here, a seemingly simple dichotomy emerges: the liberal socialist urbanites are to help educate, civilise and modernise the local

peasant population – many of them Muslim Bosniaks – even as cracks appear in the couple's relationship.

But underneath that simplistic surface lies a melodrama of surprising grace. An early sequence sees Divna arriving into Zenica. She first witnesses the furious building of apartment blocks before the camera cuts to a minaret and cobblestone streets: the old Ottoman Bosnia and the new socialist Bosnia coexist here in far more disruptive and fragmented ways than the dichotomies of socialist realism allow for. The couple see themselves as cultured Belgraders, and yet struggle to adapt to Zenica or to local custom, arriving as fish out of water. Hiding beneath the surface is a film about a cracked sense of regional and national identity, producing a surprisingly vibrant work.



#### Wednesday 16:30

#### My Apartment

Dir: Zvonimir Berković; Yugoslavia; Short Film; 1963; 13 mins

Starring: Liljana Gener, Ivo Kadić, Ivan Uzelac, Gordana Skok, Marijan Saridžić

A young girl writes about her family's apartment in this delicious satire of housing conditions on the outskirts of Zagreb. She writes of her old, cramped, pre-war tenement. Then she writes glowingly of her new post-war block. The new socialist utopia is being built for the working family... so long as you don't focus too closely on the details. And director Zvonimir Berković focuses on quite a few details: audio is restricted to a few sound effects and the young girl's voiceover, ensuring that the gags themselves are largely silent.

#### Love Affair, or the Case of the Missing Switchboard Operator

Dir: Dušan Makavejev; Yugoslavia; Feature Film; 1967; 66 mins

Starring: Eva Ras, Slobodan Aligrudić, Ružica Sokić, Miodrag Andrić,

Of Dušan Makavejev's astonishing first four features, *Love Affair* appears to be the lightest and frothiest. After all, it seems set on simply telling a love story, about two lost souls in Belgrade, where Izabela (Eva Ras) meets Ahmed (Slobodan Aligrudić) and the two immediately hit it off. Yet Makavejev throws in mock documentarian affects – an interview with a sexologist, and a visit to the mortuary to analyse the body of a dead woman who, it quickly becomes obvious, is Izabela. The awkward sterility of these segments clashes with the light breeziness of the romance at the heart of the film and the darker undercurrents sleeping underneath.

Because this is also a film about a Belgrade attempting to come to terms with its own modernity. Izabela is an ethnic Hungarian from Vojvodina, Ahmed a Bosnian Muslim; the modern metropolis where the new multiethnic Yugoslavia emerges. She is a switchboard operator, he a rat exterminator (how sweet!): two jobs at the grubby end of urbanisation. *Love Affair* is deeply conscious of the way in which romance and sex is tied to wider ideological structures and to cinema; when Eva Ras tells the camera her desires and fears, she is recognising the camera's importance to this relationship.

#### Other Film Screenings - Clarke Hall

Tuesday, 22 July April, 13:00

Wardens' Gardens – Directed by Dmitry Omelchenko

"Wardens' Garden" is a unique film in which former prison officers reminisce about their work in Khony, Georgia in the last decade of the USSR. The film is inspired by studies of historical memory, its transmission and, in particular, the legacy of the Gulag, aspects of the spread of prison culture throughout the body of the former Soviet Union. Khony was the location of five correctional labour colonies based on tea plantation that was just one piece of the vast penal monolith run by the Soviet prison system. The film tells the story of Tsulukidze ITK no.46 through the memory of the people who lived in and worked in the colony in the last decade of the Soviet era.

#### Introduction and Q&A - Mikhail Nakonechnyi (University of Helsinki)

#### A Long Way Back - Directed by Dmitriy Omelchenko

"You can be free in prison, and in captivity outside it." This isn't a film about religion, nor about tests of faith, nor about addiction. It's a story about the fate of people, who found each other and began to believe in the possibility of salvation not only in the metaphysical realm, but here and now. The film tells the story of parishioners and a pastor of the Pentecostal Church in the town of Tomsk in Siberia. The film's protagonists had committed crimes of varying seriousness while suffering from drug and alcohol addictions that had resulted in incurable illness. Having lived through long years of incarceration, they are making perhaps their final attempt at salvation and freedom.

Stories, emotions, pain and hope are intertwined into a portrait of Ukraine fighting for life and freedom.

#### A state in a State

A State in a State is an experimental documentary film that traces the construction, disruption, and fragmentation of railroads in the South Caucasus and Caspian regions, observing how these transport infrastructures have come to materialise the fragile political borders that re-emerged after the collapse of the Soviet Union. The film revolves around the scenes of delay and waiting that constitute cargo mobility, countering optimistic narratives about the New Silk Road and examining how the iron foundation of connectivity is used as a weapon of exclusion and geopolitical sabotage.

Tekla Aslanishvili is an artist, filmmaker, and essayist based between Berlin, Tbilisi, and Vienna. Her practice explores the multifaceted regimes of infrastructural governance, examining how ports, railways, and smart city projects function as technologies of citizenship and sovereignty.

She is currently an IFK Fellow, a doctoral candidate at the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna, and a Graduate School Fellow at the Berlin University the Arts. Her work has been screened and



exhibited internationally, including at M HKA – Museum of Contemporary Art, Antwerp; Berlinische Galerie; SculptureCenter, New York; Taipei Biennial 2023; WIELS, Brussels; Eye Filmmuseum, Amsterdam; Schirn Kunsthalle, Frankfurt; Transmediale 2023, Berlin; LOOP Festival – Fundació Antoni Tàpies, Barcelona; Neue Berliner Kunstverein; the 14th Baltic Triennial; Tbilisi Architecture Biennial; Short Film Festival Oberhausen; and Kunsthalle Münster. She was a Digital Earth Fellow (2019), a nominee for the Ars Viva Art Prize (2021), and the recipient of the Han Nefkens Foundation – Fundació Antoni Tàpies Video Art Production Award (2020).

Evelina Gambino is the Margaret Tyler Research Fellow in Geography at Girton College, University of Cambridge. Her research is concerned with a situated analysis of global logistics. Through ethnographic work around connectivity infrastructures in Georgia and the South Caucasus, Evelina's research maps the ways in which planetary projects of circulation, such as the Belt and Road Initiative, are translated into local contexts. In dialogue with feminist critiques

of capitalism, her analysis highlights the different kinds of work that this translation entails. Evelina's work has been published within and beyond academia. Since 2017 she has collaborated with artist and director Tekla Aslanishvili on several multimedia projects, including the experimental documentary "A State in A State" (2022). She is co-editor of the volume "Gendering Logistics: Feminist Approaches to the Analysis of Supply Chain Capitalism" and is currently completing a monograph that proposes a feminist, materialist approach to the study of infrastructural failure.

#### Taming the Garden, A Film by Salomé Jashi

A powerful man, who is also the former prime minister of Georgia, has developed an exquisite hobby. He collects century old trees along Georgia's coastline. He commissions his men to uproot them and bring them to his private garden. Some of these trees are as tall as 15-floor-buildings. And in order to transplant a tree of such dimensions some other trees are chopped down, electric cables are shifted and new roads are paved through mandarin plantations.

The film moves the concept of uprooting from its metaphorical meaning into an oppressive, tangible and yet surreal reality.

#### About the author

Salomé Jashi was born in Tbilisi, Georgia in 1981. She first studied journalism and worked as a reporter for several years. In 2005 she was awarded a British Council scholarship to study documentary filmmaking at Royal Holloway, University of London.

Her earlier work, *Bakhmaro* (2011), made in co-production with ma.ja.de. filmproduktion and MDR/Arte, received an Honorary Mention for a Young Documentary Talent at DOK Leipzig, was awarded as the Best Central and Eastern European Documentary at Jihlava IDFF, and was nominated for the Asia Pacific Screen Awards and Silver Eye Awards.

Salomé is the founder of two production companies: <u>Sakdoc Film</u> and Microcosmos, both producing documentaries and fiction of high artistic quality. She was a fellow of Nipkow Scholarship in 2017 and DAAD Artists-in-Berlin Program in 2020.

Salomé Jashi's statement on *Taming the Garden*:

"There are many things I would like to say with this movie — maybe a few too many, in fact. None of them are straight up in your face. It's entirely up to the viewers to uncover these layers — they can uncover as much as they want, as much as they see fit, coming from their own perspective and experience. To me, this film is like the experience of hiking in nature. Maybe you hear a howl in the distance for a moment or notice the grass swaying oddly in the gentle breeze, or you feel a sudden gust of cold air on your sweaty neck. At times, these moments evoke visceral feelings, and at other times, they are pure facts. In this way, the film becomes an individual experience."

#### Professor Heather Coleman

Prof. Heather Coleman, a historian of Russia and Ukraine specializing in religion and modernization in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. She is author of the monograph Russian Baptists and Spiritual Revolution, 1905-1929, co-editor of Sacred Stories: Religion and Spirituality in Modern Russia, and editor of Orthodox Christianity in Imperial Russia: A Source Book on Lived Religion, and these works have been recognized for their intellectual rigor and a nuanced understanding of the historical and political complexities of the region.

Prof. Coleman's significant service to the international community of Slavic and East European Studies scholars is also evident in her ten years of service as editor-in-chief of Canadian Slavonic Papers. As noted in the letter of nomination: "She made the journal truly international, with 52% of all authors hailing from countries other than Canada. Under Prof. Coleman's leadership, the journal became an anchor of our international community, facilitating lively scholarly exchange across borders and publishing in both English and French." ICCEES proudly recognizes Prof. Coleman's outstanding contributions and service to Central and East European Studies.

#### Professor Mitsuyoshi Numano

Professor Mitsuyoshi Numano has made significant contributions as a specialist in Russian and Polish literature. His numerous, and award-winning, scholarly monographs and articles, in Japanese, English, and Russian, include such titles as "Is There Such a Thing as Central (Eastern) European Literature?" A Guide to Contemporary Russian Literature, and An Excursion to the End of the Twentieth Century in Eastern Europe and Russia.

Prof. Numano's most notable contributions have been promoting the integration of the scholarly community of Japan and the entire East Asia into a global commonwealth, which has facilitated academic exchange both regionally and internationally. As the President of JCREES, he co-chaired Asia's first ICCEES World Congress held in Makuhari, Japan in 2015.

Prof. Numano was instrumental in organizing the East Asian Conference on Slavic Eurasian Studies, which has been held 12 times from 2009 to 2024. He has established trusting relationships with Slavists in China and especially in South Korea, where he has many disciples who graduated from the University of Tokyo.
